Through the generosity of our UUC congregation and 4 community sponsors, we provided 20 Christmas boxes this year to 19 families and one organization (Gil's Hills, for whom we supply sustainable disposable tableware for their after school program). Partners who provided families to sponsor included ACCORD, Alfred-Almond Central School, Alfred State Nursing Department, Allegany County DSS, SHAPE/Catholic Charities.

Across the 19 families, we provided Christmas cheer to 47 children and 25 parents/caregivers in the form of gifts, food for a Christmas meal (including turkeys and hams purchased through monetary donations), homemade Christmas cookies, and food to fill their pantries. Many thanks to the diaconate for their work in securing boxes (and to Stearns for donating boxes), ordering turkeys, gathering cookie tins and packing cookies. Many hands certainly do make light work.

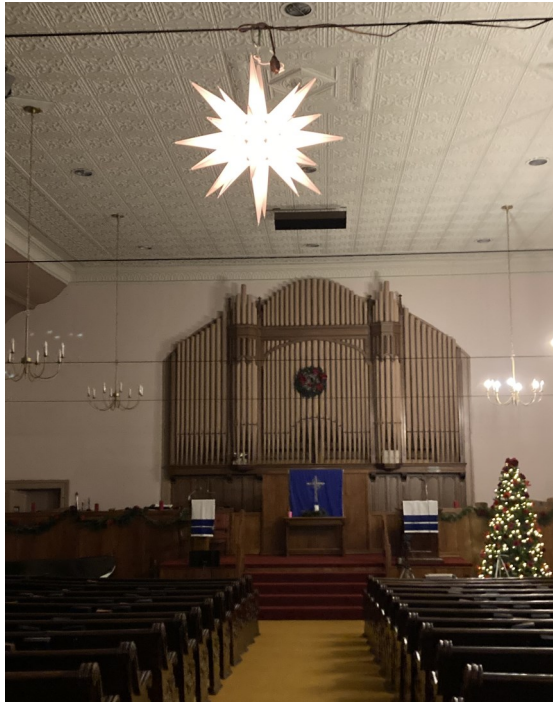

Lenten Project: Heifer International

Once again this year the Board of Elders has selected “Fill the Ark” through Heifer International as our Lenten Project. Last year we raised \$1,185 (which was tripled by a Heifer International matching grant) enabling us to purchase 3 goats, 8 flocks of chicks, 2 sheep, 1 alpaca, 1 water buffalo, and 1 water buffalo share. Lent begins on February 14. Let’s spread our love by giving generously to this year’s ark. We will survey the congregation to determine your “favorite” animal donations. Here is the list: flock of chickens (\$20), goat (\$120), heifer (\$500), pig (\$120), sheep (\$120), water buffalo (\$250), flock of ducks (\$20), honeybees (\$30). Checks should be made out to UUC with “Heifer” noted on the memo line.

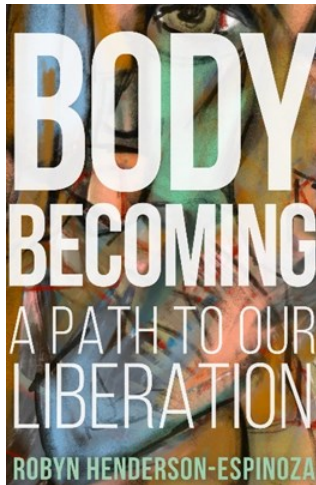

Who was St. Valentine? A History Lesson

St. Valentine was a priest who was executed around 270 A.D. There are many things we don't know about this martyr, but there are numerous, sometimes conflicting, stories about his life and death. One says that he was slain for performing weddings in secret after the Roman Emperor, Claudius II, had outlawed them. Another legend says it was because he helped Christians escape from brutal Roman prisons.

In 498 A.D., just over 200 years after Valentine's execution, Pope Gelasius declared February 14 as St. Valentine's Day. Valentine's love for God and humanity has made him "the patron of love" in the Roman Catholic Church and for people around the world.

By the mid-1700s it was common practice for friends and sweethearts to exchange trinkets made in the shape of hearts or to send handwritten notes of affection on February 14. It's believed that Valentine himself sent the first "valentine" while imprisoned. He is said to have written a letter to a young girl who visited him in prison just before his death. He signed the letter, "From your Valentine," a sentiment still used today.

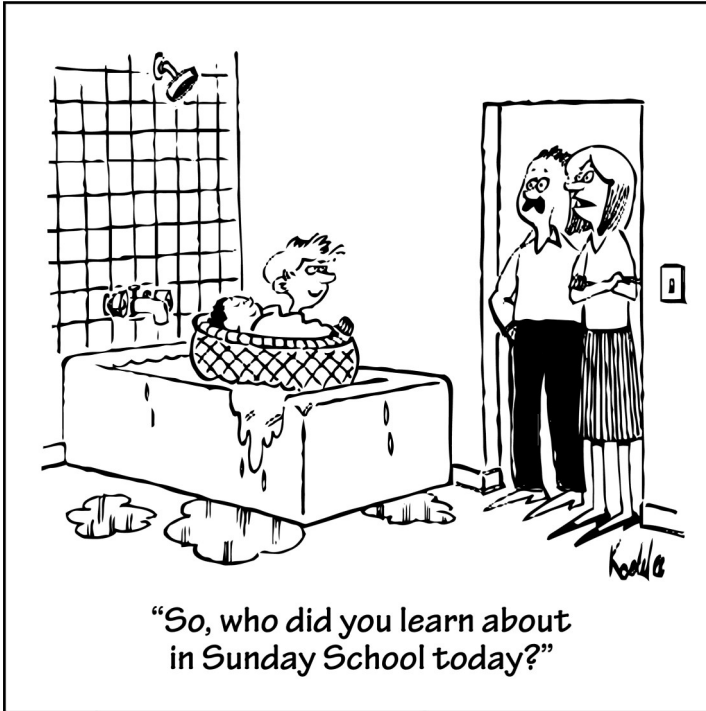
